

SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT
YEAR A 1 December, 2019

First Reading Is 11:1-10

A reading from the prophet Isaiah



A shoot springs from the stock of Jesse, a scion thrusts from his roots: on him the spirit of the Lord rests, a spirit of wisdom and insight, a spirit of counsel and power, a spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord. (The fear of the Lord is his breath.)

He does not judge by appearances, he gives no verdict on hearsay, but judges the wretched with integrity, and with equity gives a verdict for the poor of the land. His word is a rod that strikes the ruthless, his sentences bring death to the wicked. Integrity is the loincloth round his waist, faithfulness the belt about his hips.

The wolf lives with the lamb, the panther lies down with the kid, calf and lion cub feed together with a little boy to lead them. The cow and the bear make friends, their young lie down together. The lion eats straw like the ox. The infant plays over the cobra's hole; into the viper's lair the young child puts his hand. They do no hurt, no harm, on all my holy mountain, for the country is filled with the knowledge of the Lord as the waters swell the sea.

That day, the root of Jesse shall stand as a signal to the peoples. It will be sought out by the nations and its home will be glorious.

Second Reading Rom 15:4-9

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

Everything that was written long ago in the scriptures was meant to teach us something about hope from the examples scripture gives of how people who did not give up were helped by God. And may he who helps us when we refuse to give up, help you all to be tolerant with each other, following the example of Christ Jesus, so that united in mind and voice you may give glory to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

It can only be to God's glory, then, for you to treat each other in the same friendly way as Christ treated you. The reason Christ became the servant of circumcised Jews was not only so that God could faithfully carry out the promises made to the patriarchs, it was also to get the pagans to give glory to God for his mercy, as scripture says in one place: For this I shall praise you among the pagans and sing your name.

Gospel Mt 3:1-12

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

In due course John the Baptist appeared; he preached in the wilderness of Judaea and this was his message: 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.' This was the man the prophet Isaiah spoke of when he said:

A voice cries in the wilderness:
Prepare a way for the Lord,
make his paths straight.

This man John wore a garment made of camel-hair with a leather belt round his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then Jerusalem and all Judaea and the whole Jordan district made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins. But when he saw a number of Pharisees and Saducees coming for baptism he said to them, 'Brood of vipers, who warned you to fly from the retribution that is coming? But if you are repentant, produce the appropriate fruit, and do not presume to tell yourselves, "We have Abraham for our father," because, I tell you, God can raise children for Abraham from these stones. Even now the axe is laid to the roots of the trees, so that any tree which fails to produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown on the fire. I baptise you in water for repentance, but the one who follows me is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to carry his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fan is in his hand; he will clear his threshing-floor and gather his wheat into the barn; but the chaff he will burn in a fire that will never go out.'

Message from Parish Priest

Morning Prayer from the Official Prayers of the Roman Catholic Church

The official prayers of the Roman Catholic Church, known as the Liturgy of the Hours, along with the Eucharist, has formed part of the Church's public worship from the earliest times. These prayers consist of the Psalms in the Bible, together with a reading from Scripture, and intercessory prayers. Christians of both Western and Eastern traditions (including the Latin Catholic, Eastern Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, Oriental Orthodox, Assyrian, Anglican, Lutheran, and some other Protestant churches) celebrate the Liturgy of the Hours in various forms and under various names.

Last Friday, Evening Prayer from the Liturgy of the Hours was prayed by the faithful instead of the First Friday evening Mass because all the clergy were with the Archbishop at a Clergy Conference. Some parishioners have asked why a Communion Service cannot be celebrated when no priest is available. This practice is usually reserved for countries where no priests are available for weeks on end; otherwise, the mistaken impression is given that the central feature of the Eucharist is the reception of Holy Communion. The Eucharist is not only a *Sacrament*, but a *sacrifice*. Unlike a Communion Service, the Mass is a sacramental representation of the Sacrifice of Christ that took place once and for all.

When Jesus gave us the Eucharist at the Last Supper, he gave us this Sacrament as the fulfilment of the Old Testament Passover meal. The significance of the Passover meal began, not with the meal itself, but with the *actual sacrifice* of the Paschal Lamb which was the *central feature* of the whole Passover. There is further evidence that the sacrifice of the paschal victim was central to the Passover. Participating in the Passover by observing the sacrifice of the paschal lamb was deemed so important by the Jews, that failure to attend this sacrifice resulted in excommunication for all males twenty years old and upwards. Since the Eucharist is the fulfilment of Passover meal, participating in the Sacrifice of Christ is the *central feature* of the celebration of this sacrament, not the reception of Holy Communion.

In light of this understanding, the Liturgy of the Hours is a better alternative than a Communion Service, when a priest is only temporarily unavailable, as the Liturgy of the Hours is the official prayer of the Roman Catholic Church. Since Jesus himself prayed the Psalms, the Church teaches that Christ's prayer is continued by the Church when the faithful pray the Liturgy of the Hours. Given that no Mass is celebrated on Monday mornings, I invite you to participate in Morning Prayer from the Liturgy of the Hours which will take place every Monday morning at 9:15 am.

Use of the Photocopier in the Parish Office

Apart from the parishioners who have received authorisation to use the Parish's photocopier to photocopy documents relating to the ministries, no one can use the photocopier without my prior approval or one of the Assistant Priests in my absence.
