He humbled you, he made you feel hunger, he fed you with manna which neither you nor your fathers had known, to make you understand that man does not live on bread alone but that man lives on everything that comes from the mouth of the Lord.

Gospel Jn 6:51-58

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John
Jesus said to the Jews:

Then the Jews started arguing with one another: 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?' they said. Jesus replied: 'I tell you most solemnly, if you do not eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you will not have life in you.'

Anyone who does eat my flesh and drink my blood has eternal life, and I shall raise him up on the last day. For my flesh is real food and my blood is real drink. He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood lives in me and I live in him. As I, who am sent by the living Father, myself draw life from the Father, so whoever eats me will draw life from me. This is the bread come down from heaven; not like the bread our ancestors ate: they are dead, but anyone who eats this bread will live for ever.'

Message from the Parish Priest

Corpus Christi Sunday

Can you remember what you learned in your English classes about what a metaphor is? If I were to say to you that a man is as strong as an ox, what is this figure of speech called?

A simile. Alternatively, if I were to say that a man is an ox, what would this figure of speech be called? A metaphor.

Today, Jesus says something that some people mistakenly think involves the use of a metaphor. Jesus says to the crowd: "...my flesh is real food and my blood is real drink. He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood lives in me and I live in him." In these words, Jesus is literally offering his own body and blood so that like him, we can live forever by being sustained by his resurrected, glorified body.

Now that the churches are open, we do well to return to coming to Mass if we are able. Watching a live-streamed Mass is a good option if you want to remain self-isolating on account of still feeling vulnerable in the pandemic or if you are in regular contact with people who are elderly. For all other people, live-streamed Masses are merely a simulation of this sacrament.

Message from the Parish Priest (Continued)

Given that Jesus comes to us in his own flesh and blood in the Mass, we do well to return to worshipping God in the church in our own person so as to respond to his loving presence and participate in the Eucharistic sacrifice.

The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus

The Solemnity of The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus will be celebrated on Friday 19 June this year. Devotion to the Sacred is essentially a form of reparation. St Paul provides insight into how the afflictions of Christ and His Church are one and the same: “*Now I rejoice in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I complete what is lacking in Christ’s afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the church*” (Col. 1:24). Is there anything lacking in Christ’s Passion and Death? Was Christ’s suffering insufficient to redeem and purify us completely? The holistic answer is this: it is *sufficient for all*, but not *all efficient*. That is, Christ’s suffering was *objectively* sufficient for our salvation, but not *subjectively* because due to attachment to sin and human weakness, not every Christian does penance. For this reason, St Paul said that his sufferings help to “complete what is lacking in Christ’s afflictions.” The “afflictions” of Christ he is referring to here are not those the Person of Christ has undergone once and for all, but the afflictions Christ continues to undergo in the members of His Mystical Body, the Church. (The Church is called Christ’s “*Mystical Body*” because in a mysterious way it is Christ Himself).

Since Christ’s Body is afflicted in this sense, St Paul deems reparation to be necessary. In other words, although Christ’s redeeming Sacrifice is now *finished*, it is *continuing* in the members of the Church. This means that when we, as members of Christ’s Body, participate in His Passion, we are cooperating with him in his mission to redeem the world. The world is in much need of redemption on account of the current turmoil that is robbing many people of peace. So, I invite you to console the Sacred Heart of Jesus by being generous in response to his sacrificial love for us.

O Sacred Heart of Jesus, to Thee I consecrate and offer up my person and my life, my actions, trials, and sufferings, that my entire being may henceforth only be employed in loving, honoring and glorifying Thee. This is my irrevocable will, to belong entirely to Thee, and to do all for Thy love, renouncing with my whole heart all that can displease Thee.

I take Thee, O Sacred Heart, for the sole object of my love, the protection of my life, the pledge of my salvation, the remedy of my frailty and inconstancy, the reparation for all the defects of my life, and my secure refuge at the hour of my death. Be Thou, O Most Merciful Heart, my justification before God Thy Father, and screen me from His anger which I have so justly merited. I fear all from my own weakness and malice, but placing my entire confidence in Thee, O Heart of Love, I hope all from Thine infinite Goodness. Annihilate in me all that can displease or resist Thee. Imprint Thy pure love so deeply in my heart that I may never forget Thee or be separated from Thee. I beseech Thee, through Thine infinite Goodness, grant that my name be engraved upon Thy Heart, for in this I place all my happiness and all my glory, to live and to die as one of Thy devoted servants.


WAYS YOU CAN HELP:

Social Distancing & Other Procedures in Church

When you arrive to Our Lady of Rosary Church Fairfield, there are a number of things to keep in mind.

In order to contain the spread of COVID-19, we ask each person to keep social distance of at least 1.5 metres between one another, which is about two arms' lengths. Once arriving to the church, you will be asked to register your name and your details at the registration desk. This information will be kept up to four weeks after the religious gathering, so that if there is an outbreak, attendees may be contacted as soon as possible by NSW Health. You will be asked to sanitise your hands with the provided hand sanitiser and you will then be ushered to a pew.

Let us unite together as a community, and protect one another at this challenging time, by following simple guidelines while practicing the virtues of patience and understanding.
