**The Thirty-First Sunday in
Ordinary Time - Year A
(All Saints Day 1 November, 2020)**

Entrance Antiphon *Cf. Ps 104:3-4*

Let us all rejoice in the Lord,
as we celebrate the feast day in honour of all the
Saints, at whose festival the Angels rejoice
and praise the Son of God.

First Reading *Rv 7:2-4. 9-14*

A reading from the book of the Apocalypse

I, John, saw another angel rising where the sun rises, carrying the seal of the living God; he called in a powerful voice to the four angels whose duty was to devastate land and sea, 'Wait before you do any damage on land or at sea or to the trees, until we have put the seal on the foreheads of the servants of our God.' Then I heard how many were sealed: a hundred and forty-four thousand, out of all the tribes of Israel.

After that I saw a huge number, impossible to count, of people from every nation, race, tribe and language; they were standing in front of the throne and in front of the Lamb, dressed in white robes and holding palms in their hands. They shouted aloud, 'Victory to our God, who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb!' And all the angels who were standing in a circle round the throne, surrounding the elders and the four animals, prostrated themselves before the throne, and touched the ground with their foreheads, worshipping God with these words, 'Amen. Praise and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honour and power and strength to our God for ever and ever. Amen.'

One of the elders then spoke, and asked me, 'Do you know who these people are, dressed in white robes, and where they have come from?' I answered him, 'You can tell me, my Lord.' Then he said, 'These are the people who have been through the great persecution, and they have washed their robes white again in the blood of the Lamb.'

Message from Fr. Bob Bossini

Dear Friends,

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of All Saints. We recognise today those who have lived holy and faith filled lives. These are the people mentioned in our first reading today, those from 'every nation, race, tribe and language...dressed in whit robes' [Revelation 7:9.13]. These saints whose lives we celebrate today are the ordinary people who simply and truthfully lived out the message of the Gospel. The Catechism of the Catholic Church makes reference to this by stating that a saint is the holy one who leads a life in union with God through the grace of Christ and receives the reward of eternal life. The Church calls this the Communion of Saints, the Communion of the holy ones [cf CCC # 823,946].

The notion of holiness is central to our understanding of what comprises a saint. The Second Vatican Council calls us to a life of holiness, which we seek through fidelity to the vocation that God has given to each of us: single, married, consecrated or ordained. The challenging concept here is that in recognising and celebrating the concept of the Communion of Saints, an item of faith that we declare in the Creed on Sundays, we need to appreciate that these people may be those who lived amongst us as family, friends, associates and community members. One can appreciate the 'place' in which these people now live when one considers the gift of eternal life: the gift of heaven. We can appreciate this great gift when we contrast it with the concept of hell. Traditionally, hell has been seen as a place of eternal torment – of everlasting fire, with demons tormenting the souls of the damned. The writer and theologian C.S. Lewis (1898-1963) in his work entitled *The Great Divorce* (1945), gives a picture of hell as being quite drab. He states that it is a place of total isolation, where its inhabitants spend an eternity moving farther and farther from each other. It is a place of total self-distancing. Heaven then is conceived as in a totally opposite way – as place where souls move closer together and thus closer to God in complete adoration of God's divine majesty and goodness.

To receive this eternal reward then becomes the result of living a holy and God-filled life. Today's Gospel [Matthew 5:1-12] gives us an idea of how this life should be lived as it presents us with certain qualities that comprise a good Christian life. Matthew states four qualities that allow us to be receptive of the great love that God has for us: to have a poverty of spirit; to live a life of gentleness; to be prepared to mourn with those who are sorrowful and to be hungry in wanting the justice and righteousness of God's kingdom to be a reality.

Matthew also tells us that there are four qualities that demonstrate our readiness to work for the characteristics of God's Kingdom: to live by, and to show mercy; to live with a purity of heart – a single mindedness that allows us to continually focus of God's ways; to be peacemakers; and to be willing to continually love the Lord without counting the cost- to be faithful to God's ways even in the midst of persecution.

As we celebrate this great day – the remembrance of those ordinary people who have lived holy and faithful lives and now share in eternal glory – we can meditate on the words given to us by John in our second reading: 'my dear people we are already the children of God but what we are to be in the future has not yet been revealed; all we know is, that when it is revealed we shall be like him because we shall see him as he really is. Surely everyone who entertains this hope must purify himself, must try to be as pure as Christ' [1 John 3:3]. What we celebrate today – All Saints Day – is the reward given to those who have faithfully lived out their Christian vocation and to anticipate what awaits us if we do the same.

Love one another. Just as I have loved you. (John 13:34)

As the Pope's international mission agency, Catholic Mission plays a vital role in responding to the call to love God and our neighbor by forming individuals and communities as missionary disciples of Jesus, sharing their faith in action and prayer.

Every October, during World Mission Month, Catholic Mission focus their appeal on one particular program. This year they are partnering with *The Arrupe Centre* in north-western Cambodia. Started in 2001 by the compassionate Bishop Enrique 'Kike' Figaredo Alvargonzalez, the Centre supports young residents with disabilities due to landmine incidents or other illnesses. Offering children the potential to live a full life by providing education, healthcare and opportunities for many, including a young man called Chen, whose life (and that of his family) was impacted so suddenly by a landmine incident which took both of his legs at the age of 16.


