Message from Fr. Bob Bossini

Dear Friends,

For a second successive Sunday we see Jesus being targeted by the religious leaders. Last week the Pharisees and Herodians tried to trap Jesus over the issue of the payment of tax to the Romans [Matthew 22:15-22]. In the scene that immediately follows this, but which does not form part of the Sunday liturgy [Matthew 22: 23-33] we have the encounter between Jesus and the Sadducees over the issue concerning the resurrection from the dead. Jesus concludes his conversation with them by stating that God is a God of the living and not of the dead, and that such marital relationships do not matter in the afterlife [Matthew 22:23-33].

Today the Pharisees make a second attempt at entrapping Jesus by asking him to define which is the greatest of the commandments [Matthew 22:34-40], expecting him to possibly state the observance of the details of the Law would rank as a primary obligation. Jesus however presents a very different and unexpected reply to their question. Jesus brings together two texts from the Hebrew scriptures: Deuteronomy 6:5 and Leviticus 19:18, one dealing with a person's relationship with God and the other with interpersonal relationships.

Both form the two sides of the same coin. One cannot have love of God without a wholesome love of self and of others. Similarly, a deep, practical, healthy and realistic love of self and others leads to a love of God.

This is spoken of by many spiritual writers. For example, **St Frances de Sales (1567-1622)** in his work **The Treatise on the Love of God** suggests that *“We are called to love our God in a neighbourly way, and called to love our neighbour in a God-like manner.”* Gerard W. Hughes, SJ in his book of Lenten reflections **O God, Why?** (2000) suggests that *“we can only admit to loving God as much as the person we love the least.”*

In other words, love of God and love of neighbour go hand in hand. We cannot admit one, without involving the other. We cannot claim to love God completely, when we fail to show love and consideration towards those who make up our lives. John reminds us of this in his letters when he states that *‘anyone who says: ‘I love God’ and hates his brother is a liar’* [1John 4:20]. Our love of neighbour in a God-like manner suggests that the love we have for each other stems from the fact we are all created in the image of God and loved by God.

One of the most difficult and challenging aspects Jesus' summation of the Law is the part which asks us to love each other as we love ourselves. This calls for a healthy self-love, one which is based on the appreciation of who we are in the eyes of God. It challenges us to go beyond a restrictive and ego-centric self-love to one which is positive, creative and life giving. Such a love can only be gained and lived if we appreciate the great love that God has for us. In the light of today's Gospel, perhaps I can spend some time assessing the depth of my love for God in light of the love that I have for those around me and the positive appreciation I have of myself.


